### **Board Election 2024**

Later this month, you will receive your election materials, including your ballot/proxy. The ballot/proxy serves two functions this year; as a proxy, it establishes a quorum for our Annual Meeting, and as a ballot, it will determine which of the three candidates are elected to serve on the POA Board. You must read this information carefully. For the past eight years, we have encouraged voting electronically through our website. There will be a link there to our online voting portal.

To vote online, you will need your account number for your username and pin number for your password. You can find your account number on your assessment bill or photo ID card. Your pin number is the number you use when you call in gate passes for guests. You can also find these two numbers at the top of your ballot in your the Annual Report mailing.

Voting online is easy and secure and speeds up the process of vote tabulation. Last year over 84% of our votes were received electronically. To further incentivize online voting, we have eliminated the prepaid postage from the return envelope if you choose to vote by mail. The postage for each returned ballot via prepaid postage cost \$1.55 per piece and dramatically slowed returns. If you don't have access to a computer at home, we are happy to have you use our lobby computer at the POA Service Center on Surrey Lane for electronic voting. Sign the proxy and mark your ballot for no more than three candidates. If you vote for more than three, your ballot will be declared invalid. Cumulative voting is prohibited. (You can only vote for a candidate once).

### **Quorum Requirement**

To be valid, we must have 51% participation in the election and the Annual Meeting. If we do not reach a quorum, another mailing will need to be sent at the cost of several thousand dollars. Some of you may remember in years past, during the election process, we made a quorum for the election but failed to make a quorum for the Annual Meeting, prompting us to send out a second mailing to obtain a quorum for our Annual Meeting. A second mailing today would cost the association over \$9,000 in hard costs, such as postage, stationery, and printing, plus numerous hours of staff time to facilitate. Our governing documents would require the cost of a second endeavor, but I am sure you will agree that it is a frivolous and unnecessary expense to all of you. We need to make a quorum on the first mailing. It is far more efficient and cost-effective to do this once.

In years past, the Board and staff needed to call in volunteers to make follow-up phone calls to property owners who had not voted in order to make a quorum. We also resorted to handing out fliers at the Security Gates, urging property owners who had not yet voted to go to the POA Service Center and fill out a ballot/proxy. All these efforts, though successful, diverted valuable board and staff resources. We realize you are all busy, and filling out another form may not be at the top of your list. However, the alternative is costly and diverts resources from other important tasks.

As an inducement to make our Quorum Requirement, the POA has an incentive program. Provided we make our quorum requirement by March 18, 2024, every ONLINE ballot/proxy from a member in good standing that is received by that date will be placed in a drawing for a \$400 gift certificate that can be redeemed at the POA office for merchandise, classes, ARB fees or used as a credit against next year's assessment. Five ballots will be drawn at random, and each will be issued a \$400 gift certificate. This is for ONLINE BALLOTS ONLY.

The deadline for your Ballot/Proxy to be in the POA office is Thursday, March 21, 2024, to be counted for the Annual Meeting on Saturday, March 23. Our Annual Meeting will be held at 10:00 AM at the Plantation House.

### From the President's Desk

Happy Valentine's Day! Let us first congratulate Officer Michael Howard of our Security Department, who has been chosen to be Security Officer of the Year by the Greater HH Security Chief's Association!

As we move into February, the time has come to consider our upcoming election to fill the three available 2024-2025 Board seats. Five candidates will be on the ballot - four selected by the Nominating Committee and one submitted by petition. Please take the time to read about the backgrounds of all five in this edition of *Planation Living*. I would also encourage you to attend the Coffee with Peter on Thursday, February 22 at 10:00 AM at the Plantation House where you will have the opportunity to be introduced to and hear from each of them as well as to ask them questions.

The election cycle started during the fourth quarter of 2023 with requests for applications, interviews of the eight candidates who submitted an interest form, and the selection of four by the Nominating Committee to be placed on the ballot. As noted above, one additional candidate submitted an acceptable petition to be placed on the ballot as well.

In January, the Board approved John Gilbert as the new Election Committee Chair, due to the unfortunate passing of Margita Rockstroh, who had been chair. The Election Committee's responsibilities include selecting, through a random draw, the order that profiles will appear on the printed ballot, in *Plantation Living* and how they will be introduced at the Coffee with Peter. They are also responsible for counting any paper ballots. Since 2015, we have also had electronic voting. In 2023, 84% of residents voted online. It is secure, convenient, and saves time for all involved.

Voting will start at the end of February and end on March 21, with the result being announced at our Annual Meeting on Saturday, March 23. Please take the time to learn about our candidates and vote!

Otherwise, continue to enjoy all the HHP has to offer. The new Dolphin Head facility is in full use, clubs and others now meeting there, kids enjoying the playground, basketball and pickleball courts in use, and many enjoying the fire pit, picnic facilities, and extended Bluff walk.

### **Coffee with Peter**

Our next Coffee is scheduled for Thursday, February 22 10:00 AM at the Plantation House parking lot. The first part of our meeting will have the usual updates and a question-and-answer period. During the second part of the meeting, you will have the opportunity to meet the Candidates who are running for the three open seats on the POA board. This will be an excellent opportunity for you to meet and mingle with the candidates. Please take some time to review the information on pages 5-8 about each of the candidates. Remember our community works best when everyone participates. Please educate yourself on the background of each of the candidates, jot down any questions you may have and bring them to the meeting. Please read the front-page story regarding the incentive special program the POA has set up to encourage voter participation.

If you are new to our lovely community these coffees are a great way to get up to speed on the operations of the Plantation. As usual the Coffee will be hot and fresh and the donuts and other goodies plentiful.

### **Dolphin Head Renovation Feedback**

The commentary we are receiving on the newly renovated Dolphin Head Recreation area has been exemplary and is accompanied by a few legitimate suggestions.

The refrigerator was a concern as it was old and just looked out of place in such a nice new facility. This item has been replaced with a new stainless-steel refrigerator with an ice maker in the bottom freezer. We also received concerns regarding the parking lot lighting and the acoustics inside the new building. We have asked for pricing to add additional parking lot lights, and we are in the process of soliciting suggestions from acoustical professionals to see if we can identify a low-cost option to absorb some of the sounds inside the building to make it less of a "lively" space when holding events.

We have also received suggestions to expand the hard-surface court that is lined for both basketball and three pickleball courts. We did not specifically publicize the reasons for the dimensions of the hard surface play area as it is built over an active archaeological site. We needed to get special permission from the State of South Carolina to build and dig in that active area, which was purported to be in the "barnyard" of the historic Myrtle Bank Plantation House. You can sometimes see the old foundation of the Myrtle Bank Plantation House at low tide, looking north into the Port Royal Sound. A historical plaque on the railing overlooking the Port Royle Sound denotes this historical site as well as providing a brief history of the area.

The location of the Hard Surface Sports Court is designated as a sensitive archaeological area; we not only had to apply to the State for permission to place our court above these artifacts, where three of the Picnic Shelter footings were

located, we also had to hire an archeologist to oversee the hand digging of each footing and assure all the soil was sifted for possible artifacts, the artifacts then had to be cataloged and a report had to be provided to the State. Artifacts were found and are now in the care of the Coastal Discovery Museum. They will be displayed at some point inside the new Dolphin Head Rec Building. We were only allowed to cover so much of the active area and then only allowed to pour concrete on top of the area so as not to disturb and preserve any artifacts that may be below the surface.

Some folks have asked for this hard surface court to be expanded and/or a fence to be built around the hard surface court to act as a barrier for balls from pickleball play. Such an installation raised three concerns. First, the size of the court was approved by the State and Town. Second, as the court is being used for basketball as well as pickleball, we have a concern that folks will run into the fence while playing basketball. The third concern is related to digging in this archaeologically sensitive area will require another application to the State of South Carolina for permission to place a fence in that area, which, if approved, will require the POA to secure an archaeologist to supervise the hand digging of each footing for the fence and have the soil excavated and sifted for artifacts. The artifacts would need to be cataloged, and a report would need to be drafted for the State. This would all be at our expense.

### Just a reminder - if you are a member of the Spring Lake Racquet Club you may reserve the pickleball courts at Dolphin Head for no fee.

Chairs were specifically omitted from the deck area as residents, clubs, and the Activities Department that reserve the facility are entitled to the use of all the deck spaces. Having chairs would seem to encourage others to occupy these deck spaces when exclusive use is granted to the party leasing or reserving the building for a private, club, or class function.

We did not advertise that this area was an active archaeological site so as not to have individuals digging in the area looking for artifacts on their own in an unauthorized manner. Feedback on the new site is still coming in, and we will make further adjustments based on feasibility, safety, and cost considerations. We were limited in our choices for the placement of many of the elements that comprised this renovation; specimen trees played a significant role, as did the path system's proximity to the water and the requirement that much of the pathway system be finished with a pervious surface so water would perk through the surface. We appreciate all the compliments and suggestions and hope everyone will enjoy this beautiful new facility.

#### **Committees**

The HHPPOA board is advised by several standing committees. These committees include Finance, Covenants, Communication, Maintenance, Recreation, Security, Election, and the Architectural Review Board. Each committee has a specific area of expertise. Members of these committees are chosen from among the members of the POA in good

standing and serve for a period of one year in accordance with guidelines adopted by the Board. The committee system provides an invaluable service to the Community by tapping members' expertise for the benefit of the POA. If you have an interest in sharing your time and talent, please consider filling out the interest form inserted into this issue and returning it to Sharon White at the POA Service Center. (The form is also available online at hiltonheadplantation.com) The board generally makes its committee appointments at its April Board meeting.

#### **Golf Courses**

Each of the Golf Courses located on Hilton Head Plantation provides excellent services to their members and guests. I would encourage all HHP residents who play golf to consider one of these fine institutions for their needs.

A few facts about our golf courses that may not be known to all residents:

- -Each of the Golf Courses within Hilton Head Plantation pay an assessment to the POA which help offset residential assessments.
- -There is a 30-foot easement on residential lots that boarder the golf course which permits Golfers to retrieve their errant ball if it lands in the back yard of private residence adjacent to the golf course within the easement area. If the private property is a vacant lot the golfer may play their ball within the easement area.
- -Work on golf courses may begin prior to 7:00 a.m. to facilitate play during the spring, summer, and fall.
- -Each of the golf courses use reclaimed water from Hilton Head Plantation to irrigate the turf areas. This water is purchased from PSD#1 and is stored in three holding ponds located within HHP.
- -The land that comprises each of the golf course properties is used as part of the open space requirement for determining the ratio between the permitted residential land and open space.
- -The four Golf Courses (Bear Creek, Dolphin Head, Oyster Reef, and the Country Club of Hilton Head) that call Hilton Head Plantation home permit residents on to their cart paths before and after play for walking and biking. Please observe the signs that each golf course provides which indicate the times when the cart paths are available for resident use. Using the cart paths during non-designated hours is dangerous and discourteous to the golfers playing the course. Please use the cart paths during the designated hours only.
- -Please respect the Golf Course property by keeping your activities confined to the cart paths. Do not throw your trash anywhere on the golf course or the POA common areas adjacent to Golf Course property. Dog waste also needs to be bagged and discarded with your household waste management plan.

### **Pedestrians**

Many of our secondary roads also serve as connectors for our extensive leisure paths system. Please be mindful that

walkers, joggers, cyclists etc. share our roadways. Stop signs mean STOP for pedestrians, cyclists, and motor vehicles. Please observe the posted signage for everyone's safety.

**Safety tip** - If you are using our leisure paths with a bicycle, please make sure you alert pedestrians to your approach from behind. Walkers, Dog walkers, joggers, etc., please do not use headphones that will not allow you to hear what is going on in your immediate environment. When walking, jogging, or running on our roadways, please travel against traffic. If you are traveling on a bicycle, please ride in the same direction as vehicular traffic.

#### Smart 911.com

Just a reminder- If you go to www.smart911.com you will be given the opportunity to put your medical information into a 911 data base. Once this information has been entered the secure site if ems is called to your home the paramedics can access your medical history and needs while on route saving valuable time. Participation is not mandatory, and you can enter as much or little information as you wish. This system is now being used by the Town of Hilton Head Island's Fire and Rescue Department.

### Election Materials - A reminder about the 2023 Audit and Return Envelope

The Annual Meeting and Board voting mailing will not contain the 2023 Audit. The 2023 Audit will be made available on our website, email blast, and hard copies will be available at the annual meeting and at the POA Service Center. The 2023 voting was also the eighth year property owners were able to vote online electronically. Last year more than 84% of the votes were cast online.

This year the Annual meeting will be on Saturday March 23, 2024. Once again, to further encourage on-line voting the return envelope for mailed ballots will not have prepaid postage. The pre-paid postage costs you the property owners approximately \$1.55 to process and often times delays returns. This year if you chose to vote by "snail mail" (paper ballot) you will need to affix a stamp on the return envelope. The Board would like to eventually go to an all online voting arrangement at some point in the future. This is the next step in that process.


serves as the foundation for the experience and insights I offer in my quest to serve as an HHP board member.

### WILDLIFE SAFETY REMINDER

Please be mindful of our alligator and wildlife population on Hilton Head Plantation. HHP is home to alligators, six venomous snakes, coyotes, spiders, etc. Most alligators have a healthy fear of humans. If you suspect and can identify an alligator demonstrating aggression towards humans, please report it to Security so they can investigate and determine if the alligator is indeed aggressive.



Please exercise caution and common sense.



The February meeting of the Fishing Club will take place on Wednesday, February 28, at 6:00 PM at the Plantation House. As this is being written, we have not yet received confirmation from a speaker. The dinner theme is Italian. Final details will be e-mailed as the meeting date approaches. February fishing in our freshwater lagoons isn't great. The cold water shuts down the fish's metabolism; they don't require much food, and they don't have the energy to chase after it. Once the water temperature drops to 50 degrees,

fishing really slows down. It will improve when the water warms to 65. Look for signs of bass spawning sites over the next few weeks (sandy patches near the shore). That's a sign that fishing activity will be picking up soon.

While most of our freshwater fishing targets largemouth bass, most of the largest fish caught in our ponds are catfish. The Club hasn't stocked catfish for several years but when we did, it was primarily in two lagoons, "Kid's Pond" (next to the POA Office) where we used to hold an annual tournament for Plantation children, and Spring Lake, where the Kids Kamp children fish twice a week. One additional lagoon was stocked with catfish by a Plantation resident at his own expense. Since most of our lagoons are inter-connected you will find an occasional cat in other lagoons. Catfish feed on the bottom, but they will hit some of the same lures used for bass. The Kids Kampers catch them using worms (and hot dogs!). That tip came from one of the Kids Kamp counselors last summer and it really worked. If you want to try something different, try fishing for catfish in Spring Lake or the POA pond with a half inch piece of hot dog. There are some big cats in those ponds and they put up a good fight.

Last year, fishing in the freshwater lagoons could be frustrating, as almost every cast hooked into weeds. The pond management company which had the POA contract proved to be ineffective at controlling weeds and has been replaced. In addition to making fishing next to impossible, weeds can have a detrimental effect on water flow through the lagoon system if they are uprooted during heavy rainstorms and plug the piping between connecting lagoons. A new company has been contracted and hopefully weed control will be improved. To be fair, controlling weeds is not easy, as EPA regulations severely limit which chemicals can be used. Take a look at the Club's website (HHPFishingclub.com) and consider joining us!

Now is the time to reinvigorate your winter garden and plan your spring and summer gardens. According to the Clemson Extension, in February, there's

still time to plant broccoli, mustard and collard greens, radishes, lettuce, and white potatoes, too. Fertilize heavy feeder vegetables-lettuce, spinach, garlic, onions. Additional gardening information is on our website www.hhpfarmers.com.

Anxious to start working in your garden? While March 15 is our average frost-free date, if the weather's mild, many farmers plant spring veggies earlier in March.

As you plan your garden, consider Crop Rotation, Companion Planting, and Succession Planting to ensure a productive garden, maximize your space, and spread out your harvest. Crop Rotation -don't plant the same vegetable in the same place every year. Companion Planting- putting different types of plants close to each other can boost growth, repel pests, and use your garden space more efficiently, allowing you to harvest more varieties in a given space. Planting marigolds among many of your crops is an effective insect deterrent. Succession Planting is a method of planting one crop after another to increase harvest; by staggering plantings, your production may be higher and maximize your available space. More details are available online and at the Clemson Cooperative Extension website. When planning and planting your garden, please add a few extra plants or rows to donate to the Farm Sale and Saint Stevens.

Many struggle with squash bugs, which destroy not only squash but also pumpkins, watermelons, cucumbers, etc. If planted in early March (you will need to cover if we get a cold snap), you can probably harvest some of these veggies before the insects destroy your plants.

Some highlights include 178 American White Pelicans, 2 Eagles, 108 Semipalmated Plover, 5 Osprey, 117 Hooded Mergansers, 38 Red-bellied Woodpeckers, 12 Eastern Phoebe, 3 Great Horned Owls and 1 Barred Owl.

### Woodcarvers

Are you looking for a hobby that allows you to create beautiful keepsakes or practical items without spending hundreds of dollars just on getting started? Wood carving checks all of those boxes. It is a type of woodworking in which people use knives, chisels, and other hand-held wood carving tools to create figures or designs in pieces of wood. A wood carver's most basic tools are carving knives, such as whittling knives, chip carving knives, and hook knives. Whittling knives are all-purpose tools, while chip carving knives feature a thin, short blade that allows carvers to chip away small bits of wood. A hook knife, or spoon knife, has a bent blade shaped like a hook and is ideal for carving spoons and other pieces with hollowed-out areas. Most woodcarvers start by whittling. They find a small piece of softwood and use a pocket knife to create a toy or a trinket. Whittling is the most basic type of wood carving since the only essential tools are a wood carving knife and a honing strop. Chip carving starts with a flat piece of wood. Carvers "chip away" bits of wood to form a design on the wood's surface. Chip carvers use gouges as well as carving knives. Most woodcarvers do not build or repair furniture. They work on a much smaller scale. Come and visit with us at the Plantation House on Thursdays from 12:30 to 2:30. See if you might be "cut out" to be a woodcarver. Your grandkids will benefit from your newfound skill.



At our last craft sale, we displayed a pillow made from a Mola. A Mola is a textile used in traditional women's clothing of Panama and Columbia. Molas are hand-made using a reverse

appliqué technique. Reverse applique is a method where you layer your fabric and then cut away the top layer to reveal what is underneath. This gives a textured and layered look to the applique. Regular applique, in contrast, has the shapes stitched on top of the backing fabric instead of underneath.

For a Mola, several layers (usually two to seven) of different-colored cloth are sewn together; the design is then formed by cutting away parts of each layer. The edges of the layers are then turned under and sewn down. The finest Molas have extremely fine, almost invisible stitching.


